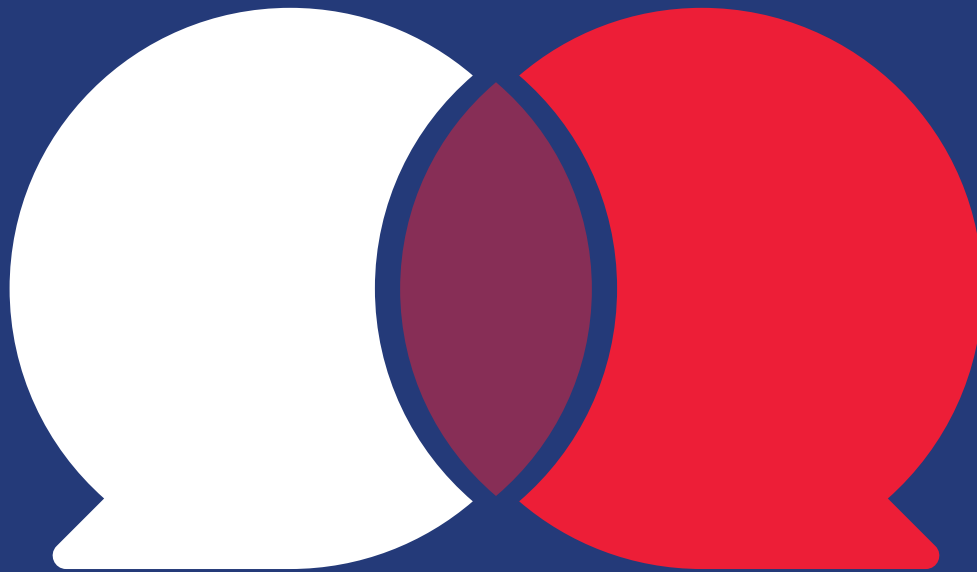

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1. A Word of Welcome from the IEN Foundation

Founded in 1951, the Institute of North American Studies (IEN) has been a space for connection, learning, and dialogue between Catalonia and the United States for more than seven decades. 3. Transatlantic Dialogue Diploma Certificate Course

What is it?

The IEN Transatlantic Debate Competition is an international academic program organized by the Institute of North American Studies (IEN) in Barcelona, bringing together university students from Catalonia and the United States to debate in English on key global and diplomatic issues. Participants work in binational teams, representing either the U.S. Administration or the European Commission, and take part in a month-long preparatory course that includes workshops and institutional visits before the final debate rounds in April. The initiative aims to promote critical thinking, intercultural dialogue, and diplomacy, offering students a unique opportunity to learn, connect, and earn the Transatlantic Dialogue Diploma Certificate.

What it means for students?

The IEN Transatlantic Debate Competition is a chance to go far beyond the classroom — it's an opportunity to experience diplomacy in action, strengthen communication and leadership skills, and gain a deeper understanding of global affairs. By working in binational teams with peers from different cultural and academic backgrounds, participants learn to think critically, collaborate across perspectives, and engage respectfully in complex international discussions. It's also a way to build meaningful connections, discover Barcelona through its key institutions, and add a unique, internationally recognized experience — the Transatlantic Dialogue Diploma Certificate — to their academic and professional profile.

How has the debate developed?

The IEN Transatlantic Debate Competition unfolded in two main phases. First, during the Transatlantic Dialogue Diploma Certificate Course in March, participants were prepared through academic sessions, workshops, and institutional visits — including the Parliament of Catalonia, the U.S. Consulate General, and the European Commission — which provided them with direct exposure to real diplomatic environments. During this phase, students met their peers and engaged in team-building activities that led to the formation of binational teams based on compatibility and shared interests. The second phase took place on April 9–11, 2026, when the debate competition was held in Barcelona over three days. Teams represented either the U.S. Administration or the European Commission, debating in English on issues of transatlantic relevance before a panel of judges, culminating in the final round and award ceremony.

4. Pointers and research development

Question to debate:

In the context of the Digital Service Act, should governments have the authority to regulate digital platforms to protect public discourse or does such regulation constitute a threat to free expression?

How students prepared for the debate?

To prepare for the IEN Transatlantic Debate Competition, participants engaged in a rigorous process of research and reflection on current international affairs, particularly issues related to U.S.–EU relations, diplomacy, and global governance. Throughout the Transatlantic Dialogue Diploma Certificate Course, they received guidance through institutional visits, expert-led sessions, and structured workshops designed to strengthen their public speaking, argumentation, and critical thinking skills. Students collaborated closely with their teammates, conducted joint research, and practiced how to structure and deliver clear, persuasive arguments in English. Above all, they approached the experience with openness and intellectual curiosity, embracing the opportunity for growth, teamwork, and constructive engagement across different perspectives.

How does a debate work?

In the IEN Transatlantic Debate Competition, each debate simulates a diplomatic dialogue between two institutions — the U.S. Administration and the European Commission — rather than a traditional “win-or-lose” format. Teams are composed of one Catalan and one American student, who work together to research, prepare, and defend their assigned institution’s position on a key transatlantic issue.

Each debate follows a structured format in English lasting about 36 minutes:

Opening Statements (3 minutes each) – Both sides present their institution’s position, outlining key arguments and policy priorities.

Rebuttals (4 minutes each, twice per team) – Each side responds to the other’s ideas, not by attacking, but by building on them to find common ground, reflecting the true spirit of diplomacy.

Closing Statements (2 minutes each) – Each team summarizes their stance, highlighting the main points of convergence and lessons learned.

Finally, the judges deliberate and give feedback focused on clarity, teamwork, and diplomatic reasoning.

Rather than aiming to defeat the opposing team, participants are encouraged to collaborate, listen, and negotiate, developing arguments that move the discussion forward — just like in real international diplomacy.

7. Judges



Dr. Juan Corona

Juan Corona Ramón is a Spanish economist and senior academic specializing in public economics, fiscal policy, and public finance. His research has focused on taxation systems, fiscal decentralization, and the relationship between institutional structures and economic development, contributing to debates on territorial financing and public governance in Spain. In addition to his academic career, he has held responsibilities linked to the European Court of Auditors, the European Union institution responsible for auditing EU finances and ensuring accountability in the management of the Union's budget, underscoring his involvement at the European level in matters of public financial oversight.

He served as Rector of the Universitat Abat Oliba CEU, where he led the university's academic strategy, research development, and institutional representation. He has also held multiple governance responsibilities within university councils and advisory bodies, and he serves as President of the Institut d'Estudis Nord-americans, promoting transatlantic academic exchange and research collaboration.



Xesco Reverter

Xesco Reverter Baquer is a Catalan journalist specialized in international affairs, widely recognized for his work as a foreign correspondent for TV3. Throughout his career, he has reported from key global capitals, including Washington, and covered major geopolitical events, bringing complex international issues closer to the public with clarity and depth.

With extensive experience in political analysis and on-the-ground reporting, he combines journalistic rigor with a deep understanding of global dynamics. His expertise in communicating international politics and evaluating arguments in high-stakes contexts makes him an excellent judge for academic debate, particularly in topics related to geopolitics and transatlantic relations. His academic expertise and practical experience in international legal and political issues make him a valuable judge for scholarly debate.



Dr. Lluç Vidal

Lluç Vidal López is a Professor at the Universitat Oberta de Catalunya (UOC) and Director of its Bachelor's Degree in International Relations. He also serves as co-Principal Investigator of the research group on International Relations and International Law (GERD), contributing actively to the study of global political dynamics and governance.

His research focuses on international security, cooperation and conflict in the Asia-Pacific region, with particular expertise on Japan's foreign policy and China's regional influence. With a strong academic background and an international outlook, he brings analytical depth and strategic perspective to his role as a judge in academic debate.

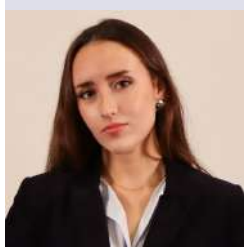

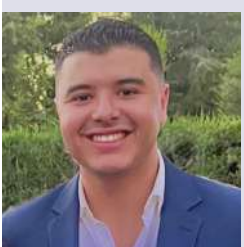

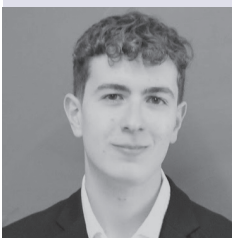
Mario Lafuente Rodríguez, Naval Engineering

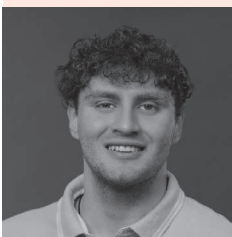
Camiyah King, Political Science

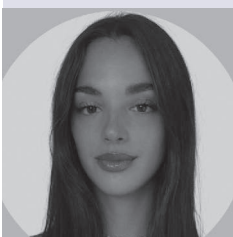
Ariadna Larisa Teixidó Ponsa, Law and Politic Science
